



# Project Update

**CAUTION: CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES OCCURRING 24/7  
ALONG THE LILLOOET RIVER FSR**

KM	Activity along the Lillooet River FSR
KM 22-34	Helicopter active in area to fly poles into place on Sunday September 28.
KM 38.5	Concrete works at the Boulder Creek HEF Powerhouse. Tunnelling continuing at the Boulder Creek HEF. Blasting will occur daily.
KM 38	<b>Caution:</b> High traffic area at the entrance to the Camp Road (Pebble Mainline).
KM 38 - 42	Concrete Truck will be hauling day and night from KM 38 along the FSR and turning into the two powerhouse locations (i.e. KM 38.5 and KM 42). <b>Drive cautiously in this area.</b>
KM 39.5 Athel Main	Construction of the Boulder Creek Intake Access Road and Crane Pad along the Athel Main Line Road. Blasting will occur daily. Hauling of material from the Intake area to KM 0 of the Athel Main. Day and night shifts working.
KM 41 – 42	Concrete works at the Upper Lillooet River HEF Powerhouse.
KM 42	<b>NOTE:</b> Clearing of the penstock right-of-way will start Monday September 29. A section of the penstock crosses the new Lillooet River Trail and flaggers will be controlling access into the trailhead when falling occurs in this area.
KM 48	Construction activities at the Upper Lillooet River HEF intake. Blasting will occur daily. Day and night shifts working.

Lillooet South FSR	<b>KM 6 to 4.5 :</b> Helicopter yarding wood above Lillooet South FSR on Saturday September 27 & Sunday September 28 <b>KM 4 to 2.5:</b> Excavator working above road in right-of-way <b>KM 2:</b> Road building up Branch S200 road Active log hauling along FSR starting Monday September 29
Ryan River FSR	No activity at this time.
Salmon Main	Right-of-way clearing continues at the end of the Salmon Main Road.
Pemberton Creek Main	Road upgrade works and right-of-way clearing.
