Storm warning for Wednesday through to Friday with up to 75 cm in the forecast.

Avalanche hazard expected to climb to **HIGH**.

Expect delays for avalanche control Thursday-Friday.

Winter Road Conditions – Be Prepared!

Work sites are operational

KM	Activity along the Lillooet River FSR
KM 37.5	Check Point Booth
KM 38.5	Boulder Creek HEF Tunnel Portal site is open. Boulder Creek HEF Powerhouse/switchyard/tailrace site is open.
KM 39.5 Athel Mainline Road (aka Boulder Intake Road)	Access road plowed for first 100 metres. Boulder Intake – GATE CLOSED at KM 3 for Mountain Goat restriction.
KM 39.7	Drive cautiously in this area – especially KM 39.7 to Km 41.2 as this is a narrow section of road (one-way traffic at a time). Please note the new traffic control lights in place through this area.
KM 41.2	Upper Lillooet River HEF Powerhouse/switchyard/tailrace site is open.
KM 42	Lillooet River Trail OPENED by RSTBC – Trail is covered in snow and ice with multiple avalanche paths along the trail. Use at Your Own Risk!
KM 49	Work crews at the intake. Large turn around plowed at the Keyhole Bridge

Avalanche Control and Snow Clearing along Lillooet River FSR

- Pullouts for snowmobiles are maintained. Please ensure vehicles do not block the FSR.
- Parking lots at KM 8.5 (snowmobile staging to the Hurley) and KM 42 (Lillooet River Trail) are cleared.
- Active and passive control of avalanche zones may occur along the Lillooet River FSR and the road can be closed at any time for such control activities, if and when required. Avalanche technicians will block the road on either side of avalanche control area during control activities and once the area is deemed safe, the road will be reopened.
- Plans are subject to change.

Be Prepared to Self-Rescue during Winter Conditions

PLEASE NOTE: CRT-EBC will allow a person in need to contact emergency services in town from the camp phone line to assist them but CRT-EBC will **not** be providing any services/amenities or responses to the public or stakeholders unless under the lead of other agencies (e.g. RCMP, Search and Rescue). Anyone entering the backcountry during the winter/avalanche season must be prepared for all situations and be able to self-rescue.
